

Statement about Pupil Premium

For the financial year 2015-2016 the school received £26,536 in Pupil Premium funding.

The money was used in the following ways

- Provision of interventions for children to improve their skills in communication, reading, writing and maths
- Provision of 1-1 tuition for identified pupils
- Provision of support for children experiencing personal, social and/or emotional issues
- Subsistence of educational visits where appropriate
- Subsistence of extra-curricular clubs where appropriate
- Provision of musical tuition
- Purchase of specific mathematics intervention for targeted pupils
- Provision of additional adult hours in Reception to support small group intervention.
- provision of science week to engage and enthuse disengaged learners
- Part-funded the purchase of the Numicon mathematics scheme to improve mathematics progress in this identified group.

By the time pupils leave at the end of year 4 all have made good progress or better from their relative starting points. The remainder were 'Developing' towards these expectations.
